How you get there

- 1 High school diploma** Grade 12
 The minimum in most postings. Alberta's career service lists a high school diploma, a clean criminal record check and a clean driver's licence as the base requirements.
- 2 Get a diploma or get experience** 0 to 2 years
 Most employers prefer a 2 year college diploma in criminal justice, police foundations or law enforcement. Up to two years of related experience can stand in for it.
- 3 Start where the door is open** 1 to 2 years
 Parking enforcement, animal services, seasonal park patrol or a small town posting. These are the usual first jobs.
- 4 Get appointed** On hire
 A municipality appoints you as a bylaw enforcement officer and, in most provinces, as a provincial offences officer so your tickets stand up in court.
- 5 Specialise** Year 3 onward
 Property standards, licensing, noise, animal control or investigations. Senior roles run whole programs.

Pros and cons

- + Law enforcement work with mostly daytime hours
- + Municipal pension and benefits
- + Cheap and fast to get into compared to policing
- People are hostile and you have no police backup on most calls
- You are enforcing rules some residents think are petty
- Small town jobs pay a lot less than the national median

Good to know

The rules change at the city limits

Bylaws are local, so what you enforce in one city is legal in the next one. Officers who move municipalities have to relearn the whole rulebook.

Toronto's bylaw list is longer than you think

Municipal Licensing and Standards in Toronto handles noise, illegal poster, off-leash dogs, tow trucks, nightclubs, tattoo parlours, hair salons, property maintenance and short-term rentals.

Optional boosts

Property standards and building enforcement. Business licensing and inspection. Rental and short-term rental standards. Investigations and prosecutions.
