How you get there

- 1 High school diploma or equivalent** Grade 12
Most employers want one, some do not. Math for measuring and cutting, and shop class if it is offered.
- 2 Route one: get hired as a helper** Weeks
Residential insulation contractors hire people with no experience and train them on the job. You can be working within weeks.
- 3 Route two: apply to an apprenticeship** 4 years
The mechanical insulating trade runs registered apprenticeships, usually four years, through local unions and contractor associations. Competitive to get into, paid from day one.
- 4 Safety certifications** First months
Fall protection, respirator fit testing, confined space and hazard communication training. Asbestos awareness is required on any older building.
- 5 Journeyman or lead** 4 to 8 years
On the union side you finish the apprenticeship as a journeyman. On the residential side you become a crew lead or an estimator, or you start your own contracting business.

Pros and cons

- + You can start with no experience and no debt
- + Energy codes keep getting stricter, which keeps the work coming
- + The mechanical and union side pays well with a real pension
- Attics, crawlspaces, heat, dust and fiberglass itch
- Residential pay is low and often piece rate
- Older buildings mean asbestos, which is exactly as serious as it sounds

Optional boosts

Asbestos and lead abatement certification. Spray foam certification. Mechanical insulation. Firestopping.
